Dear Friend of Weantinoge,

This week the United Nations unveiled a **draft plan** to protect 30% of the Earth's lands and waters by 2030. It is an urgent call to action to safeguard global biodiversity and slow the impacts of a warming climate.

The need for action is clear, but there is hope. Here in Northwest Connecticut approximately 23% of the region is already conserved. Weantinoge expands these natural lands by permanently



protecting on average seven new conservation properties each year. Our proactive land conservation work prioritizes climate resilient landscapes (areas where plants and animals can move to adapt to climate change), and habitats for rare, endangered, and threatened species.

Throughout the year, I will share with you regular updates on Weantinoge's work to protect the lands and waters on which you depend. With your support, the future is ours to create together.
