## **May Newsletter**

Working on land conservation at a regional scale is like doing a 3D puzzle. All of the pieces -- large-scale planning, complex negotiations, appraisals, surveys, legal agreements, and funding need to click into place in the correct sequence and at the right time.

This month, another piece of the puzzle clicked into place for a property we have been working to protect. I am delighted to announce that the **State of Connecticut awarded NCLC \$325,000 toward the purchase of The Ledges**, a 45.31-acre nature preserve in Brookfield. The funding will come from the state's Open Space and Watershed Land Acquisition Grant Program. When NCLC successfully raises the remainder of the purchase price, **the Ledges Preserve will become our 22nd public hiking preserve**. In addition, the Ledges abuts two town-owned preserves, including Burr Farm, and will expand natural land protection and recreational opportunities in a densely developed area.

In the meantime, we continue to work with a range of partners on strategic long-range conservation planning for the region. I am pleased to announce the publication of a report, Conserving Northwest Connecticut: Adaptive Strategies for Accelerating the Pace of Conservation, which we produced with Save the Sound. The innovative report written by students from the Conway School of Landscape Design details strategies for accelerating the pace of conservation as part of the global effort to conserve 30% of the Earth's lands and waters by 2030, an initiative known as 30x30.

These are just some of the projects that we are working on here at NCLC. Of course, we are also planning hikes and lectures, parties, and annual picnic. I look forward to seeing you at one of our events this summer.



# Prairie Warblers Sing at Cobble Brook Vista

While at Cobble Brook Vista to check the trail camera for **fresh wildlife footage**, Public Lands Manager, Zach Adams, heard the bouncing,

ascending notes of the prairie warbler. Zach describes this bird's song as, "Like a sunrise in an old western movie," click here to listen.

Although called the prairie warbler, these striking yellow and black striped birds live in shrubland habitats such as overgrown pastures and regenerating woodlands. In Connecticut, prairie warblers are in steep decline due to habitat loss. Visitors to Cobble



Brook Vista may have noticed a sign noting that the preserve is managed for these birds. Encountering this songbird is a reminder that when people protect land, wildlife can thrive.
