Protecting the Kent Falls Watershed




Land use determines water quality and there is no better way to ensure that Kent Falls continues to dazzle generations of families than by protecting the essential watershed lands of Kent Falls Brook. NCLC Board member, Philip Korsant, recently donated 40 acres of land on Carter Road to NCLC which includes almost 1/2 mile of Kent Falls Brook.

Fitting like a puzzle piece into a network of 1,170 acres of protected lands, this new preserve abuts Wyantenock State Forest, Kent Falls State Park, and the Appalachian Trail. The property is in an area of exceptional value to birds, a VIB, or "Very Important Bird" area. Expanding the area of protected lands within this important watershed is a gift to the region and to all of us who depend on natural systems to keep our water clean.

Busy Beavers at Cobble Brook Vista


